

Stout Surname Map





Joseph and Hosea Stout.*

Hosea Stout's Journal:

"It was while I was here on the night of the 13th of Nov. that the notable Meteoric shower took place about which so much has been said which happened while the mormons were driven out of Jackson County Missouri and now in the open fields. They hailed this as one of the signs of the Last days."

"I confess I did not know what to think of it. The sight was magnificent & grand."

Leonid Meteor Shower

The Leonids (LEE-ə-nidz) is a prolific meteor shower associated with the comet Tempel-Tuttle. The Leonids get their name from the location of their radiant in the constellation Leo: the meteors appear to radiate from that point in the sky. (1)

The meteor shower in November 1833 is part of history; sometimes it is referred to the 'night the stars fell' Multiple sources say that those who witnessed this event feared that this was the end of the world and that the stars were literally falling from the sky, others sat in amazement at this spectacular event.

Frederick Douglass is quoted as saying, "I witnessed this gorgeous spectacle, and was awestruck. The air seemed filled with bright descending messengers from the sky. It was about daybreak when I saw this sublime scene. I was not without the suggestion, at the moment, that it might be the harbinger of the coming of the Son of Man; and in my then state of mind I was prepared to hail Him as my friend and deliverer. I had read that the 'stars shall fall from heaven,' and they were now falling." (2)

"The meteor storm of 1833 was of truly superlative strength. One estimate is over one hundred thousand meteors an hour, but another, done as the storm abated, estimated in excess of two hundred thousand meteors an hour over the



entire region of North America east of the Rocky Mountains." (3)

To help you to visualize such an event, William Johnston (located in the area of St. Paul Minnesota at the time) gave this account of that particular night. "What a sight it was! The whole heaven appeared to be lit with falling stars...The night was calm, the air clear, nothing to disturb the stillness, but the hushed breathings of the men. The stars were accompanied with a rustling noise, and, though they appeared to fall as fast and as thick as hail, above them, now and then, we could see some of the fixed stars, shining as bright as ever. I can compare it nothing more comprehensive than a hail storm. The sight was grand beyond description." The account mentions that he continued to watch until "the bright streaks of day" appeared and "the light of the sun caused them to disappear." (4)



Henry Rowe Schoolcraft described it in this way; "On the east coast, "those who were up at four saw the grandest site." There were three

distinct lights in the night sky besides the usual array of stars. There were "shooting points of light" that emanated from a center point and cascaded to the horizon, "resembling a thick shower of luminous snow." Then there were "luminous bodies which hung dimly in the air." Finally, the most spectacular sight was the "falling fireballs, some which burst, while others went out of sight." They were so bright that even the smallest object could be seen as the meteors lit the night sky." (5)

The Leonids meteor shower happens every November, but it is more intense every 33 years. Never has it been as abundant and grand as it was in the year of 1833. For more approximate dates, locations and times; be sure to check out NASA's website.

ZEBULON PIKE

"Zebulon Montgomery Pike (January 5, 1779 - April 27, 1813) was an American...explorer for whom Pikes Peak in Colorado is named. As a United States Army captain in 1806-1807, he led the Pike Expedition to explore and document the southern portion of the Louisiana Purchase and to find the headwaters of the Red River.

In 1810 Pike published an account of his expeditions, a book so popular that it was translated into French, German, and Dutch. He later achieved the rank of brigadier general in the Army, serving during the War of 1812."



ABRAHAM LINCOLN

Stout Children Obituaries

Demise of Hosea Stout.

At 2:45 a. m., March 2nd, in Big Cottonwood Ward, Hosea Stout, Esq., who has figured prominently in the history of the Latter-day Saints for the past half century, passed from life, the immediate cause of his death being paralysis, with which he had been affected for the past four weeks. He was a native

of Kentucky, having been born in Mercer County, September 18, 1810, but migrated when very young to western New York and thence to Missouri, where he embraced the Gospel and from that time shared in the vicissitudes through which the Church passed. He served in the Black Hawk War, taught school in Illinois for a number of years, was intimately associated with the Prophet Joseph Smith for a number of years prior to his death, and for some time acted as his body guard, as well as being an officer of the Nauvoo Legion and chief of police. He came to Utah in 1848, and located in Salt Lake City. He was a member of the Utah Legislature for a number of sessions, also of the City Council, and practiced at the bar, when in the Territory from the time the first court was established here until a few years since, when his health became so impaired that he retired to his farm. He performed a mission to Hong Kong, China, in 1853, was also one of the early settlers of St. George in Southern Utah, where he remained about five years. He was a man of sterling integrity and excellent ability; has filled a long and useful life and leaves a large family—a wife, nine sons and two daughters, besides a large number of grandchildren to revere his memory and emulate his virtues.

Judge Hosea Stout, who was well-known throughout the Territory, died at his house in Big Cottonwood, Salt Lake County, Saturday morning.

In reference to the notice which appeared recently in the WEEKLY concerning the late Hosea Stout, his brother writes informing us that the deceased was born in Mercer County, Ky., and moved to Clinton County, Ohio, when eight years old, and further that he never resided in New York.

OBITUARY.

MILLETT.—In Kirkville, Washington County, Utah Territory, on the 16th of January, 1886, of old age and debility, Sister Anna Millett, relict of the late Artemus Millett, of Scipio, Millard County, and daughter of Joseph and Anna Stout; born in Madison County Tennessee, Dec. 22, 1806.

She embraced the Gospel in 1832, and shared the persecutions of the Saints in Missouri and Illinois with unwavering fidelity to the cause of truth. One instance might be mentioned illustrative of her pluck. When General Lucas sacked the town of Far West her step-sons were taken among the prisoners, though of minor age she in company with the wife of Brothe: Wm. Alfred, whose sons were likewise held as prisoners, rode into the enemy's camp through the jeers and curses of the mobocratic soldiery, and proceeding to headquarters, demanded and obtained the release of their sons.

She has ever lived the life of a faithful Latter-day Saint, and her nearest friends have never heard her breathe a doubt in regard to the promises of the Gospel covenant. Peace to her remains.—COM.

Death of A. J. Stout.

Allen Joseph Stout, Sen., died in Rockville, Washington County, December 18th, 1889, of old age and debility.

He was born in Mercer County, Kentucky, December 5th, 1815, but passed his boyhood in Clinton County, Ohio, where his parents located when he was three years old; removing to Missouri about the time the Saints migrated to Caldwell County. The subject of this sketch, with his brother Hosea and sister Anna, embraced the Gospel in 1838. He was one of the 60 prisoners taken by General Clark at Far West, and listened to the latter's speech in which he declared that "their fate is

fixed, their die is cast, their doom is sealed." While in the custody of the mobocratic soldiery he was closely associated with Apostle P. P. Pratt, and often spoke of looking over the latter's shoulder while he was writing the hymn found on page 315 of the Hymn Book: "Torn from our friends and captive led."

In Nauvoo he was prominent as an officer of the Nauvoo Legion, and as one of the city police. He enjoyed the confidence and personal friendship of the Prophet Joseph, and the distinction of being one of his body guard during the dark days of mobocratic peril. He shared in all the privations suffered by the Saints in their expulsion from Nauvoo; crossed the plains in 1851 and ten years later formed one of the number of hardy pioneers who settled Southern Utah, where he has since that time resided. Since the completion of the Temple at St. George he has spent much of his time in laboring therein.

Brother Stout was widely known as a man of untiring industry, a faithful friend, a kind husband and father, and ever zealous and determined in the defense of right. He survived his two wives by whom he became the progenitor of 17 children and 62 grandchildren, nearly all of whom are yet living.


